**Response of the Government of the Republic of Slovenia  
to the University Women of Europe's reply on the admissibility of  
the collective complaint No. 137/2016**

15 May 2017

1. The Government of the Republic of Slovenia (hereinafter: Government) received University Women of Europe's (hereinafter: UWE) reply of 19<sup>th</sup> March 2017 to the Government's observations on the admissibility of the collective complaint No. 137/2016. The Government was invited by the President of the European Committee of Social Rights to respond further on admissibility of the complaint by 19 May 2017.
2. The Government states that the UWE's reply contains no fact evidencing its particular competence in labour legislation and does not clarify in what respect Slovenia failed to ensure satisfactory implementation of the relevant provision of the revised European Social Charter.
3. Therefore, the Government reiterates its position that the collective complaint lodged by UWE against Slovenia does not meet the admissibility criteria laid down in the Additional Protocol to the European Social Charter Providing for a System of Collective Complaints and the Rules of Procedure.
4. The Government requests the European Committee of Social Rights to declare the complaint inadmissible for reasons explained in the Observations of the Republic of Slovenia, based on Article 6 of the Additional Protocol to the European Social Charter Providing for a System of Collective Complaints, on the admissibility of the collective complaint of the European Association of University Women (UWE) against Slovenia (submitted on 14<sup>th</sup> December 2017).
